message from our Chair of Trustees



My name is Beverley Foster and I am Chair of Yorkshire's Brain Tumour Charity. When Rachel left, as a charity we were worried about the hole she had left for us to fill, however, we were delighted when Marie Peacock joined us. Marie brings a wealth

We have taken the change as an opportunity to explore upcoming brain tumour research so that we can fund new and exciting Yorkshire-based projects in the coming year. It saddens us deeply that treatments have remained relatively unchanged for more than 35 years and we are more determined than ever to change this.

Over the last couple of years our income has remained relatively static. With a renewed enthusiasm, we are looking to ensure we are the brain tumour charity for Yorkshire, with plans to reach into communities to offer more localised support, as well as investing in our fundraising to ensure we are sustainable and to enable us to deliver new and much needed services for people when they need us, for as long as they need us.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, and all the team here at YBTC, I want to thank everyone who has helped us in our work and mission. We are looking forward to building on this success together in the year ahead.

"As a Specialist Oncology Social Worker working with large numbers of people living with brain tumours, I often turn to my colleagues at YBTC for financial help for these patients. The grants they offer are a massive help, sometimes a lifeline, to people in so many different ways.

I once applied for a grant for a woman with a high-grade tumour who was unable to work post-diagnosis and needed someone with her at all times, so her partner was not able to work either. They were self-employed and, while waiting for welfare benefits to be paid, they had used up all their savings and were relying on food banks. A YBTC grant allowed them to pay bills and buy nutritious food and reduce their stress significantly.

Another grant was for a young man who was diagnosed with a high-grade tumour but didn't have any recourse to public funds and was not able to return to his country of origin. The hospital was giving treatment but he was struggling to get to appointments as he was fatigued and had seizures, so he couldn't walk the long distance to hospital. The steroid treatment made him gain weight and with no income, his clothes didn't fit. Without the grant to buy monthly travel tickets, he would not have attended for treatments. He was also able to buy clothes that fitted him and some food. All this helped him feel part of society instead of on the edges and showed how the brain tumour community really cares and looks after each other."

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2019 funded research included...

Sheffield-based research

We funded consumables for a 3-year period for Dr Spencer Collis at the University of Sheffield. This was for research being undertaken by Clinical PhD student Ola Rominiyi and ended in Spring 2019. Ola's research involved generating 3D models of resected and residual brain tumours from an individual patient's tumour. This led to the discovery of biological differences between the types of brain tumour cells that may explain how they are able to grow quickly and become resistant to treatments. The 3D brain tumour models generated will enable further research to help identify new treatments and drug combinations that are effective at killing the resistant brain tumour cells left behind after surgery.



Leeds-based research

This year, we began a 4-year commitment to part-fund the Associate Professorship of Ryan Mathew at the University of Leeds. Ryan is also an Honorary Consultant Neurosurgeon at Leeds General Infirmary. Ryan's research interests focus primarily on brain tumour biology and precision cancer surgery using innovative technologies. He co-leads the brain tumour research lab in Leeds and is leading on several exciting projects including developing the use of robotics and AI.

"I lost my wife to a brain tumour nearly 3 years ago after a brave fight that lasted 7 years. It is dreadful the way that brain tumours force one to grieve twice, once while your loved one gradually loses all their faculties and reasoning in front of your eyes, and again when they pass away. I was always a 'fixer' in our marriage of 50 years, but this time I couldn't do a thing to stop the remorseless progress of the cancer. I felt powerless. I vowed that I would carry on the fight on her behalf to ensure that quality research into finding ways of improving the lot of brain tumour sufferers continued and improved."

"I am passionate about developing research, treatment and support locally in Yorkshire that can have an impact globally. There are very few cancers with such a devastating effect as brain tumours – in children or adults – and we need to change that."

"Someone once said to me, "I don't see the point in funding cancer research. So many millions of pounds have been thrown at this problem and people are still dying. If a cure could be found, it would have been by now".

The research within my group focuses on why the deadliest form of brain cancer, glioblastoma, often recurs after treatment, i.e. why the cancer cells don't die. We currently have 7 distinct but complementary projects investigating this question from different angles in ways it has never been inspected before. This includes

novel approaches that allow us to characterise individual cells in an unprecedented level of detail, partly thanks to funding we previously received from YBTC. Technology, and the way it alters what we can do in the lab, is expanding at a rate of knots. In the year 2000, we sequenced the human genome for the first time. It took 13 years and £3 billion. Today we can sequence the genome from a cancer cell in under a week for about £1,000.

So, at this moment in time there are still cancers that are incurable, including types of brain cancer. But mankind could not put a man on the moon until the day we put a man on the moon. We must keep investing in research and know that understanding begets understanding, and that tumours in the most complex organ of the human body present a huge challenge, but one that we will one day overcome if charities such as YBTC can continue to raise vital research funding."

"Maci was a happy, healthy 13 year old, until August 2017 when she had the devastating diagnosis of a DIPG - a brain tumour. For us as a family to hear that diagnosis was devastating. Since Maci gained her angel wings in October 2017, we have fundraised tirelessly to raise money to help children and families like ours, but to also fund research into childhood DIPG. YBTC have been there to support us as a family and are also funding local research into DIPG and funding the tissue bank in Leeds. There is no cure for these brain tumours in children, and very little funding into research. There has been no change in treatment for the

last 40 years! Could you imagine hearing that if this was your child? We had so many questions and very little hope, we want to change that so no family has to go through what we did."

"In 1981, after a difficult couple of months of misdiagnosis, my husband Greg was diagnosed with a Hemangioblastoma, a rare, benign brain tumour. He underwent a very difficult operation but not only survived the procedure, he then went on to make a full recovery. We were so very lucky.

On a chance meeting with a friend in 2016, I learnt that she had joined YBTC (then BTRS) and was about to open a shop for the charity. This being a brain tumour charity greatly interested me. I collected some donations, called to the shop to deliver them, saw that there was so much to do in the shop and stayed to help for the whole three days before the big opening and have never left.

Structure, Governance and Management

Known throughout 2019 as Brain Tumour Research and Support Across Yorkshire (BTRS), Yorkshire's Brain Tumour Charity is a registered charity governed by the rules contained with the "Model Declaration of Trust for a Charitable Trust" adopted on the 17th October 2002, then registered as a charity with the Charity Commission on the 13th February 2003.

Trustees

Details of the Trustees who have served during the year are listed above.

None of the Trustees had any personal beneficial interests in the Charity requiring disclosure.

Appointment of Trustees

With effect from November 2019 a new appointment process was put into practice that governs how the charity advertises for Trustees, as well as developing a new application and induction process. The process includes undertaking a skills audit to ensure the Board of Trustees is reflective of the skills and knowledge required and the communities we support.

Training of Trustees

New Trustees receive a briefing on their legal obligations under charity law; the content of our Model Declaration of Trust; our Conflicts of Interest Policy; Internal Financial Controls; Risk Management; the history of the charity; current budgets and the recent financial performance of the charity. In addition, Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate internal and external training and events to facilitate the undertaking of their role.

Management

The Trustees meet quarterly to decide broad strategy and areas of activity including research grant funding, administration, reserves and risk management. The day-to-day administration of research grants and the processing and handling of applications prior to consideration of funding is delegated to the Chief Executive Officer.

Chief Executive Officer

The Board of Trustees together with the Chief Executive Officer are considered to be the key management personnel of the charity.

The Trustees give their time freely and no Trustee renumeration or expenses were paid during the year.

The Chief Executive salary is determined by benchmarking across the Third Sector on an annual basis.

Voluntary Help and Employees

The Trustees wish to record their thanks for the hard work of the charity's staff team and the support of our much-valued volunteers who work across a range of roles including the shop, support, office and fundraising.

Risk Management

The Trustees regularly review the risk management strategy in accordance with the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for the authorisation of all patient and research grants and other financial transactions.

Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers and visitors. Fundraising guidelines are issued to all volunteers and third-party supporters to ensure they comply with charity and local authority regulations and to minimise risks to health and safety. The charity is registered with the Fundraising Regulator and complies with the Fundraising Code of Practice.

Conflict of Interest Policy

The charity has adopted a conflict of interest policy applicable to all Trustees and Staff. This policy aims to protect the organisation and the individuals involved from any appearance of impropriety. All Trustees and Staff are asked to declare their interests and any gifts or hospitality received in connection with their role in the charity. A register of interests is kept and maintained. In

accordance with the charity's policy, Trustees are required to withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises.

Objectives and Activities

The objects of Yorkshire's Brain Tumour Charity are shown below:

- 1. To provide funds for research into the treatment of paediatric and adult brain tumours. All research shall be carried out within Yorkshire hospitals and universities. All research shall be written up for publication.
- 2. To provide funds to supply medical equipment aids and equipment to Yorkshire hospitals to support brain tumour patients whilst they are in hospital. Medical staff shall identify such pieces of equipment.
- 3. To provide funds to support brain tumour patients and their families.

Funds shall be allocated with objects 1, 2 and 2 based on the needs of each object and to ensure the effective operation of the charity.

The trustees have decided to accept restricted funds, as long as such funds are used to meet the charity's general objectives.

Financial review

The financial statements are presented in the standard format required by the Charity SORP and cover the activities of the charity. The Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) shows the gross income from all sources and the split of activity between restricted and unrestricted funds.

Income

Incoming resources for the year totalled £214,823, a decrease on the previous year of £26,152.

The charity relies on the support and assistance of much valued unpaid volunteers to help within the charity shop, No 31, to act as ambassadors across the region and to organise fundraising activities.

The fundraising team reduced in 2019 from previous years to just one member of staff and this is reflected in the decrease of income. The team supports family fundraisers, corporate fundraisers and event participants, encouraging as much income diversity as possible.

Expenditure

Expenditure for the year increased to £332,771 with an increased spend on service support compared to the previous year.

Reserves policy

The Trustees endeavour to hold financial reserves equal to a minimum of 6 months running expenses plus research project commitments. At the end of 2019, the reserves were substantially greater than this and therefore this risk is minimal.

Designated funds of £82,000 were allocated for the refurbishment of the paediatric neuro-oncology ward at Leeds' Children's Hospital (L52) in July 2019. This project did not go ahead due to restrictions

at the hospital with regard to having somewhere to temporarily home the ward during the works. This work will take place in 2020 and thus the £82,000 remains as designated funding.

Investments policy and objectives

Short term funds are held in a Yorkshire Bank current account, saving deposits are held at both the Yorkshire Bank and the HSBC until required.

The main banking is with the Yorkshire Bank with some funds kept with the HSBC to reduce the risk should one bank fail.

Activities and Performance

Treatments for brain tumours have remained relatively unchanged for more than 30 years. We fund next generation research because we want to find a cure. Whilst we are doing that, we offer a variety of support for children and adults who are living with or are affected by a brain tumour. The distress caused to patients, their families and their primary carers is devastating; our services support people emotionally, practically and financially and lasts for as long as we are needed.

Telephone & Email Clinic

We increased our Support Services working days from 1 to 3 this year to enable us to provide patients and their families with increased access to telephone and email support through our confidential clinics. Scheduled call backs are a weekly activity. During the year, we actively supported 198 individuals from across the region.

Support Groups

Our patient support group is held monthly in Leeds and has continued to be well attended with 80 active members. A variety of external professional guests have attended the group over the year to give advice and information. The year culminated in a Christmas meal that had 52 attendees. The group offers a chance for people to be able to speak with others who really understand, and we are continuously developing peer support opportunities and networks.

Our Meet Up and Memories group for bereaved families was put on hold mid-way through the year and a review was undertaken. Following feedback from the 42 active members, this group will be developed and continue next year.

Patient Grants

If a patient with a primary brain tumour in Yorkshire has financial difficulties as a result of their diagnosis, health professionals can apply to us for a one-off financial grant. The stress and anxiety caused by financial difficulties can have a huge impact on individuals and their families and our grants help to reduce the worry caused at what is already a difficult time. In 2019 we also provided grants to help reduce social isolation and for patients to make a special wish come true.

We made a total of 35 patient grants in 2019, totalling £17,500.

Counselling & Hypnotherapy

We understand that it is good to talk and we provide support from trained counsellors and hypnotherapists for patients, family members and those bereaved. Where people are unable to access this service due to location restrictions we cover the cost of this in their own locality.

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Yorkshire's Brain Tumour Charity

Benefits Advice & Signposting

We arrange regular benefit clinics and direct access to one to one specialist support from a qualified and experienced social worker for patients and their relatives who need advice and information about applying for new benefits, amendments to existing benefits or guidance on completing benefit forms

During 2019, we have developed networks across the region to enable us to signpost to other localised amenities that would be of benefit, referring to other charities, council and community services to ensure the patient and their family have access to the support they need, where they live

Neuro-oncology Clinical Nurse Specialist Team

We work closely with the neuro-oncology clinical nurse specialist team at Leeds Teaching Hospitals Trust. During the year, we attended an open day at Bexley Wing with the team and hosted a meeting at No 31 to discuss and develop the support we can offer to patients from their perspective.

During the year our Trustees agreed to provide external clinical supervision for the team as an ongoing provision.

Current Research Grants

During the year we awarded a new research grant of £50,000 to be spent over the next four years to part fund the 4 year associate professorship of Dr Ryan Mathew at the University of Leeds. We continued to fund a research grant for Jenny Williams at the University of Leeds.

Research funding of £125,000 was designated by the Trustees in 2019 and allocated as spend in 2020.

Fundraising

Our Approach to Fundraising:

We receive no statutory funding and are 100% reliant on voluntary donations. To raise the majority of the funds required to continue our work, we actively support individuals, groups and corporates fundraising within the Yorkshire community. In the last year, we did not use a third party professional fundraiser or commercial participator.

Fundraising activities carried out on behalf of Yorkshire's Brain Tumour Charity is monitored closely by the Chief Executive Officer on a monthly basis to ensure adherence to the Fundraising Code of Conduct and Fundraising Promise. The charity offers an excellent supporter experience, offering advice and support to the public to ensure compliance with all legal requirements.

Fundraising Standards:

At Yorkshire's Brain Tumour Charity, we ensure that we maintain the highest possible principles when fundraising throughout the year by making sure all of our activities are compliant with all legal and regulatory standards.

As part of our commitment to high standards, we continued to deliver on all the pledges stated in our Fundraising Promise. This includes adhering to the Code of Fundraising Practice and being a member of the Fundraising Regulator.

Helping Our Supporters and Addressing Complaints:

We have ensured we are accessible to all throughout the year if they ever had a query or needed guidance. We have a Complaints Policy in place that is accessible via our website. During 2019, we didn't receive any complaints about our fundraising.

Protecting Vulnerable People and the Wider Public

We aim to make sure the privacy of our supporters is fully protected, particularly in the cases of vulnerable people. We are committed to ensuring that no vulnerable person feels subject to unreasonable intrusion of privacy of persistent or undue pressure to donate. We ensure that this is covered in staff induction training and is reviewed by the Chief Executive and staff team on an annual basis.

During the year all staff attended a workshop for managing difficult conversations to support them in handling conversations with vulnerable people.

Plans for the Future

The charity is committed to expanding the support we offer across the Yorkshire region to ensure we meet the needs of primary brain tumour patients and their families in different communities. We will be exploring increasing provision of support groups, counselling and out of hours access to support.

We will begin to develop varied income streams through the year to diversify our fundraising and reduce risk. We will do this through investment in growing our fundraising team.

In the coming year, we will gather feedback and ideas from patients and their families to inform and develop our services strategy for the future. We will also focus on refining and developing our research strategy, application processes and award policies.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic if Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Change in basis of accounting or to previous accounts

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and method of accounting) since last year and no changes have been made to accounts for previous years.

Expenditure

Recognition of expenditure	Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.
Expenditure on raising funds	These comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income, fundraising trading costs and investment management costs.
Expenditure on charitable activities	These comprise the costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services in the furtherance of its objects, including the making of grants and governance costs.
Grants payable	All grant expenditure is accounted for on an actual paid basis plus an accrual for grants that have been approved by the trustees at the end of the year but not yet paid.
Governance costs	These include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the Charity, including any audit/independent examination fees, costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity, together with a share of other administration costs.

These are support costs not allocated to a particular activity.

Taxation

Other expenditure

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Freehold investment property

Investment properties are measured initially at cost and subsequently at fair value at each balance sheet date and are not depreciated. All gains or losses are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise.

Intangible fixed assets and amortisation

Intangible fixed assets (including purchased goodwill, patents and trademarks) are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses.

Stock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Donated items of stock are recognised at fair value which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay for the items on the open market.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the statement of financial position, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings or current liabilities. In the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management.

Notes to the Accounts

Trade and other creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Research and development

Expenditure on research and development is written off in the year in which it is incurred.

Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in currencies other than the functional currency of the charity are translated at the rates of exchange prevailing at the end of the reporting period. Transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of the charity are recorded at the rate of exchange on the date that the transaction occurred. All exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at net income/expenditure.

Leased assets

Where the charity enters into a lease which entails taking substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset, the lease is treated as a finance lease. Leases which do not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to charity are classified as operating leases. Assets held under finance leases are initially recognised as assets of the charity at their fair value at the inception of the lease or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the balance sheet date as a finance lease obligation. Lease payments are apportioned between finance expenses and reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance expenses are recognised immediately, unless they are directly attributable to qualifying assets, in which case they are capitalised in accordance with the charity's policy on borrowing costs. Assets held under finance leases are depreciated in the same way as owned assets.

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term. In the event that lease incentives are received to enter into operating leases, such incentives are recognised as a liability. The aggregate benefit of incentives is recognised as a reduction of rental expense on a straight-line basis.

Pension costs

The charity operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the charity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the charity has no further payments obligations. The contributions are recognised as expenses when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals in the balance sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the charity in independently administered funds.
